Sir Nicholas Winton



Sir Nicholas Winton, who organised the rescue of 669 children destined for Nazi concentration camps, died on 1st July 2015, aged 106. Sir Nicholas, then a stockbroker, arranged for trains to carry Jewish children out of occupied Prague. He died on the anniversary of the departure of a train in 1939 carrying the largest number of children - 241. Several Ostravaks owe their live to him.

The prime minister described him as a "great man" and the chief rabbi praised his "exceptional courage".

On 5th and 6th August 2015, Gunter Demnig will lay 20 Stolpersteine in Ostrava for us. Heinz Vogel has co-ordinated the collection of all the information and the Salomonovič family have, as always, been invaluable in checking on the local sites to ensure they are suitable for laying a *Stein*. Dr Sladovnik has very kindly organised with all the administrative and practical matters with the City and national authorities. We are very grateful to all of them.

Ann Altmann wrote to us about the *Steine* that she has arranged to have laid: "It is very sad to read all the inscriptions on the list. One of the other deportees was deported to Nisko with my grandfather and one, a woman of almost the same age as my grandmother, was deported to and murdered in Minsk with her. Perhaps they offered each other some consolation... "


Now we are beginning to look for a publisher. If any of you have good contacts with an appropriate publisher or literary agent, please let David know.

On the occasion of 140 anniversary of Ostrava's Kehila we installed a temporary memorial. Students are now working on the final version of the memorial. ŽNO received a grant from FŽO, temporary memorial was paid from this grant. (part of money still left - for final version).

By the way, we have visited under way also places of my family ancestors – in Moravska Opava we found the Vila Klauber, where my grandfather Walter Bock was born. Interesting is that he and his father were lawyers, my son made an

independent decision to study law and finishes it now and in the family Klauber there were even more lawyers. And guess what is in the Vila now? There is a branch of the Court. Some Spirit of Justice?

Ann has been able to trace the Körner family in Hodonin to Israel Körner born in 1757 and has sent us a photograph of Stepan's parents, Emil and Erna:



Emil was deported to Nisko on one of the first transports of the "Final Solution." He did not return. Erna remained in Ostrava until 1941, when she was transported to Minsk where she was murdered by the Nazis.

Both my parents were born on the Czech territory but I don t have their birth certificates. My mother s name was Kaethe Donath (married Immergluek) born 10 August 1913 in Jaegerndorf / Krnov. My father s name was Max Immerglueck (Immerglick) and he was born 4 November 1905 but I don t know where (maybe in Troppau / Opava or in its surroundings.

Libuše has found that in 1910 he lived in Vítkovice and between 1910 and 1921 in Ostrava in Guttmannstrasse.
